## **Sermon - "Living As The Remnant"**

Happy New Year!

It seems so fitting to have both the Old and New testament readings today start with the beginning.

Most of us think of this time of year as a fresh start, a new beginning.

What lies ahead for you? What might this year 2015 bring for you?

I spent this past week writing my final paper for last semester's class on the state of the church in our society. After slogging my way through hundreds of pages of sociological commentary on the role of religion in people's lives, I came away with one thought.

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God...Without Him not one thing came into being...The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

My conclusion is that regardless of what the sociologists think about religion – God is still here.

God is still here and deserves our worship, our reverence, our awe.

God is still here and we, created by God, are called to serve as best we can.
