Fall Festival 2009

The Fall Festival Committee has begun meeting and planning for the annual Columbus Day weekend event. It will follow the same time frame as last year - **Friday and Saturday, October 9th and 10th, with a couple of activities on Sunday afternoon, the 11th.** No major changes are planned at this point, but if anyone has an activity or idea they would like to implement, we are always ready to listen.

As usual, we need people to fill several vacancies. **At present, three activities need organizers: the Silent Auction, the church Kitchen, and the Dining Room**

The **Silent Auction** has been a part of the auction for a number of years. Last year we scaled back its size to make room for the comeback of the Treasure Trove, but the Auction is still an activity that attracts Festival-goers and generates significant income. Former chair Sara Wardell will be happy to coach the person who can take it over.

The church **Kitchen** supplies the Dining Room with lunches on Friday and Saturday. Food is prepared ahead and served on those days to people who know where the good lunch will be. It's a great draw to get people into the building and has been since the Festival began. Again, cooks from the past will be happy to lead a new person through what needs to be done.

The **Dining Room** always has enough willing servers, but we need someone to arrange the room, schedule the staff, and oversee serving the meals on Friday and Saturday. See the above Kitchen description for the importance of the lunches. Former chair Sarah Polhemus has all the details.

Looking ahead to 2010:

Fall Festival Chairman Lee Collins has been on the Committee for a long time, and he will step down next year. **It would be best for someone to work along side him this year before assuming the Chair in 2010.** The work involves planning and organizing from April through the Columbus Day weekend in October - not an onerous task, since the people one works with are all good and dedicated workers. But the planning and overseeing the event are obviously crucial to its success.

We know that times change, as do church events and activities. The Fall Festival involves most of the churches in town to some extent, and our church has always been a leader in it. If the tradition is to continue, new people are needed every year to assume positions of responsibility for it.

Two serious considerations:

1) If we cannot find people to head up the three above departments for 2009, they must be scaled back or eliminated.

2) If there is no one to chair it in 2010, we face the option of eliminating our church's participation in the Salisbury Fall Festival. That would be a big step backward in our relationship with other churches and businesses in town.

From the Pastor's Desk

We've had two wonderful dialogue discovery sessions now, with a third coming just around the corner of your reading this. As most of you know, our first one focused on the defining of our most strongly-held values as they are related to church life. The results were quite revealing. With what some would call a large version of a focus group (45 people attended), we discussed the things we are most attached to, enlivened by, and convicted by in terms of their importance. We then brought the preliminary findings of this to the whole congregation for their input, in order to arrive at a larger-based consensus. The primary values we discovered were these:

- Being "Community" and Pastoral Care
- Spiritual Life
- The Worship Service
- Sense of Commitment and Involvement
- Mission and Local Outreach

Using these topics, we spent the second session identifying all of the ministries, programs and services we offer or pursue here at S.C.C. that are expressions of these core values. The lists were too long to include here, though a full reporting of these can be found on our web site. Perhaps more relevant, however, were the subsequent conversations around the strengths and weaknesses of those respective ministries. Among those findings were the following:

- (1) some of our current ministries overlap from one value to another (i.e., reflect more than one);
- (2) people who were passionate about the same ministries and programs had quite different perspectives on how they were best pursued in the context of church life (which livened the discussions);
- (3) many of the ministries would be more effective if they were expanded;
- (4) regardless of what value, ministry or program we are addressing, it will be critical to significantly augment our communication on all fronts, both external and internal.

After sharing these points, we then had small group discussions around the question, "How can we strengthen our weaknesses and challenges, and reinforce and amplify our strengths?" This was perhaps the most fruitful and productive part of the conversations, as it began the process of developing concrete recommendations for



how our current ministries can be implemented more effectively, and to reflect our values with increased integrity. Some powerful and out-of-the-box suggestions came from these discussions.

Looking forward to our next session together, the last of this trio on June 7th, we will begin asking ourselves the question, "What NEW areas of ministry can we, or should we, consider offering to our church and surrounding community, in order to further be faithful to our core values and strengths? And in what NEW ways can we bring these values and ministries into the future of our church?" These questions, at their core, address the more arching question of what God is calling us to be and do in our next chapter as a congregation in this town, in this time. This is where spiritual discernment comes into play.

One criticism that has been voiced about these sessions is that they are too focused on what the people want, instead of what God might want. And although that's a fair conjecture from the outside, those that have engaged the process have had as our primary goal to tap into God's heartbeat as we have had these discussions, through discerning prayer, in order to discover His will and ideas. And while God does not necessarily speak through the majority voice, there is a power in collective wisdom elicited from a group of people who are passionate about hearing God for our future. God does have a history of honoring those pursuits with direction and promise.

If you haven't joined in on these yet, but have an interest in the future of our church and how that future is formed, **please plan to join us on Sunday, June 7th. Your voice, your wisdom, and your prayers, are needed.**

As a young minister in Kentucky, I was asked by a funeral director to hold a grave-side service for a homeless man who had no family or friends. The funeral was to be held at a new cemetery way back in the country, and this man would be the first to be buried there.

I was not familiar with the backwoods area, and I soon became lost. Being a typical man, I did not stop to ask for directions and finally arrived an hour late.

I saw the backhoe and the open grave, but the hearse was nowhere in sight. The digging crew was eating lunch. I apologized to the workers for my tardiness, and I stepped to the side of the open grave. There I saw the vault lid already in place. I assured the workers I would not hold them up for long but would try to do the proper thing.

The workers gathered around the grave and stood silently as I began to speak. As I preached about "looking forward to a brighter tomorrow" and "the glory that is to come," the workers began to say "Amen," "Praise the Lord," and "Glory!" The fervor of these men truly inspired me. So I preached. and I preached like I had never preached before, all the way from Genesis to Revelations.

I finally closed the lengthy service with a prayer, thanked the men, and walked to my car. As I was opening the door and taking off my coat, I heard one of the workers say to another, "I ain't NEVER seen nothin' like that before, and I've been puttin' in septic tanks for thirty years."





I recently had the pleasure of participating in the New England Association of United Church Educators (NEAUCE) annual conference, May 5th - 7th, on Cape Cod. Eighty UCC Christian Educators from the six New England states were in attendance, including (to my delight) my daughter, Nancy, who was my roommate!

I attended three workshops: *The Educator as Prayerer*, *Praying in Color*, and *The Whole Church Family*, each conducted by very stimulating and provocative leaders. The keynote speaker for the event was Dr. Kirk Byron Jones, a professor of ethics and preaching at Andover Newton Theological Seminary and author of several books. Dr. Jones addressed the group three separate times on the theme "Spiritual Strategies for Slowing Down." Worship, communion, meditation, music, delicious meals, conversation, (and a lot of rain!) filled our days and fed our souls.

The NEAUCE experience has reminded me of how valuable it can be to meet with others who are on the same journey. I look forward to exploring new ideas in Christian Education and revitalizing existing ones in the coming months.

Here are two things to share with you:

1. All churches enjoy successes and face challenges. Our church can benefit greatly by fostering opportunities for dialogue and by participating in joint endeavors with other congregations and the UCC Connecticut Conference. Give a little. Take a little. Learn a lot.
2. I found the worship experiences at NEAUCE especially beautiful and very different from what I am used to. This summer, when you find yourself away from Salisbury on a Sunday, take advantage of the opportunity to attend a worship service where you are. What was different? What did you like? What didn't you like? Bring those ideas back to the deacons and the pastor.

My experience in India so far has been fantastic! I have become a part of a local community and have seen so many amazing things. During my school's summer vacation, I had a month to travel around Tamil Nadu, Kerala, Karnataka, Goa, and Andhra Pradesh, state districts in the southern half of India.

In my village I have become very close with my neighbors and host family. They now treat me like just "one of the gang," and we have such great times together.



The Pavithra Rashtriya Vidyalaya School is for children ages 3-14. It can be stressful at times, since there are over 400 students and only eight teachers, and the policies at the school can often be questionable. In general the state of Karnataka has difficulties with the teacher-student ratio and finding resources for the students. I am starting a much-needed library, which they are so excited about. My Mom recently sent us 50 pounds of books; thanks to David Rich for helping with postage! The rewards of teaching these eager kids outweighs the difficulties. Now I can say I know and understand more about India for better and for worse.

On June 27th I look forward to flying to Nepal to volunteer for WWOOF (World Wide Opportunities on Organic Farms). I hope to be there as late as October or November to experience life there beyond the monsoon season. Thanks for asking for me. See you in the fall!

What you do:


1. Decorate the paper with drawings, stickers, etc.
