Building up the Body

In the 14th chapter of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians he responds to a question about the appropriateness of speaking in tongues, also known as glossolalia. The practice of this gift of the spirit was quite common in the early church. Paul even boasts, "I speak in tongues more than any if you." But he then goes on to say, "Nevertheless, in church

(worship) I would rather speak five words with my mind in order to instruct others, than ten thousand words in a tongue." Why? Because, Paul argues, speaking in tongues does not "build up" the newcomer who has come to worship. When it comes to determin-

ing what is appropriate in the worship service Paul puts forth this principal: "Let all things be done for building up." It is our responsibility - all of us - to seek to build up the body of Christ here in Salisbury.

You may say, "But I thought that was the job of the minister and the Deacons," and the answer to that is, "Yes." BUT it is also an important aspect of the ministry of the all believers. God has given each of us gifts "for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ."

You may wonder, "What can I do?" Here are some suggestions:

- Invite someone to come to Homecoming Sunday on September 14th. Church School begins again, the choir will end their summer recess and once again bless us with their contribution to our worship, and it's the time many of us return from summer haunts.
- If you know of families in the community who might be interested in Church School, let them know about our open house on that Sunday September 14th at 9:15. A light breakfast is served by the Deacons, children have a chance to renew friendships, and church school teachers are introduced. Parents can visit classrooms with no obligation.
- If you encounter folks at worship who appear to be new, greet them, offer to answer questions they may have and communicate the UCC message in your own way: "Whoever you are, wherever you are in life's journey, you are welcome here."
- Talk with friends and neighbors about what this church means to you. Let them know about our Bible studies, youth program, prayer group, etc.

And once again I share the message of a little card I saw on a table at a restaurant:

"If you don't like what we do tell us.

If you do like what we do tell others."

And who would want to visit a church or recommend a church to others if you hear members speaking disparagingly about the worship or the programs and activities? The Deacons and I are anxious to hear about any concerns and disappointments.

We all look forward to beginning our new program year.



OUR HOUSE


This craft is a reminder of the blessing of your family and what you and your family should do for God.

What you need:

- 81/2" x 11" cardstock
- Markers or crayons
- A photograph of each person in your family that you can cut apart
- Scissors
- · Glue stick
- A hanging picture frame that holds an 8¹/₂" x 11" photo (optional)

What you do:

- Draw a colorful picture of the outside of your house. Remember to add a door and windows.
- Decide where you want each person's photo to go. Cut out a whole body (if you want someone to stand on the front porch, for example) or just cut out a face (if you want someone to be looking out a window).
- Use the glue stick to glue the cut-out photos onto your drawing.
- Write out Joshua 24:15b, NIV: "But as for me and my household, we will serve the LORD."
- To frame your picture, have an adult help you. If you don't have a frame, display your house on a refrigerator or bulletin board for everyone to see.
