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## Food Donations Response “Overwhelming”

The response to the Board of Christian Action’s request for food donations to OWL’s Kitchen on January 19th was overwhelming. We estimated that overall 100 donors brought about 800 pounds of food.

Many of our church members participated in this day of National Service, officially designated as the Martin Luther King holiday. We had registered this volunteer event with USAService.org on the internet, and we were amazed and gratified at the response from the wider community. MoveOn.org picked it up via the internet connection, and some people bringing in donations reported having seen the event on this latter web site. People coming in not only donated food, but stayed and helped box the donations, replenished the box supply, took pictures and then helped deliver the food to OWL’s Kitchen.

Sue Morrill, an Older Women’s League board member, dropped what she was doing that Monday morning and came and opened up the Kitchen and also helped us deliver the donations. Dave Heck put his pick up truck to good use in helping to transport.

It was a great day and our thanks to all who participated!

## Meet our Interim Pastor

### The Rev. Dr. Steve Austin

The Rev. Steve Austin comes to Salisbury Congregational Church from the Buffalo, NY area where he was a senior pastor at a UCC church in Amherst, NY. He moved into a house here in Lakeville on January 15th and preached his first sermon on the 18th. Steve is an intentional interim pastor, meaning he was hired to help the church define itself and its mission on its way to finding a settled pastor. He expects the process to take about two years.

“The main reason I accepted this position was that the search committee had very keenly represented the church as ready to step into this transition,” he said. “It’s my job to bring the congregation through this process.”

Steve lived in San Diego, CA for 14 years, where he was a choral music director. He then earned a doctorate in theology from San Francisco Theological Seminary and has been a pastor with the United Church of Christ since 2005. His previous experiences as an interim pastor were with parishes in Maine and Massachusetts.



An avid hiker and backpacker, Steve said he is looking forward to exploring the area. “I plan on taking great advantage of being in the backyard of the Berkshires and the Adirondacks,” he said.

He also enjoys world travel and recently returned from Egypt. He said his favorite destination so far is Venice, Italy, “for the charm of a city on the water, its cathedrals and history.” His next stop will be Morocco.

# HEARTS in the morning

Start your morning with heart. Enjoy this special breakfast with someone you love!

### What you need:

- Your favorite pancake recipe and syrup
- Pan or griddle
- Cooking spray
- Liquid measuring cup
- One 5-inch heart-shaped metal cookie cutter
- Wooden clothespin
- Spatula
- Adult help


### What you do:

1. With an adult's help, follow your recipe to make your favorite pancakes.
2. Spray cooking spray onto your pan or griddle.
3. Pour pancake batter into a liquid measuring cup. (This helps with pouring individual pancakes.)
4. Place the cookie cutter on the pan or griddle. Then clip the wooden clothespin onto the cookie cutter to act as a handle.
5. Pour batter (about 3-4 Tablespoons) into the cookie cutter.
6. Cook until the top is bubbly and the pancake is dry around the edges.
7. When the heart is ready to flip, use the clothespin to lift and remove the cookie cutter.
8. Turn the pancake with the spatula and cook until golden on both sides. Enjoy with your favorite syrup or fruit.
