Interim Pastor Search Committee

We are very pleased to report that **The Rev. Dr. Stephen M. Austin** has accepted our call to be the **Interim Pastor**. He is presently ending his ministry at a church in the Buffalo, NY, area and plans to move to town in January. He has met with the Trustees and the Deacons, and the details of his covenant agreement with us are being worked out.

Steve's first Sunday worship with us will be on January 18th. More information about him will appear in the February "Meeting House Times."

A continuing concern among members of our church family is that we cannot predetermine the length of his time with us and cannot know just what will happen during the interim pastorate. The biggest reason for this uncertainty is that we haven't been in this position for 27 years! And the process for calling both interim and settled pastors has changed since Dick came to us in 1981.

We DO know:

- our church family needs a time to get accustomed to being without Dick's leadership and WITH someone else's leadership;
- change is happening all the time, and we want to direct change as much as possible;
- an atmosphere that is becoming receptive to change will benefit the eventual settled pastor;
- lay leaders and the congregation in general will be challenged in ways that we may not have been before;
- candidates for a settled pastorate will be very hesitant to accept a call from a church which has enjoyed a fine pastor retiring after 27 years and has NOT gone through an extended interim period.

In short, we trust in our best judgment and God's will for us in these uncertain times. And while we on the Search Committee have completed the search task, we will continue to be available to help in any other way that we can.

A Message for Christmas Eve

“Ministry is a vocation of extraordinary access.” These words of seminary professor Nathaniel Guptil have frequently come to mind as I have served God in this place for the best part of 27 years. I have been privileged to minister to folks who have substantial wealth and people who sleep in their cars for lack of other shelter. I have been privileged to minister to people who have advanced degrees from elite colleges and people who have dropped out of high school. I have been privileged to minister to those who have traveled extensively and lived in foreign lands and to those who have seldom left the Northwest Corner. And of course I deal with folks who are diverse in sexual orientation, race, family backgrounds and political views.

Ministry is a vocation of extraordinary access, especially because it is often the case that when you come to discuss something which is troubling you or to talk with me about getting married or about conducting a funeral for a loved one you have been open to cutting through a lot of superficial stuff in order share your hopes, your hurts and your dreams.

The message to all that I have tried to convey in word and deed is this: You are a beloved child of God.

All of you.

The message to all that I have tried to convey in word and deed is this: You are a beloved child of God. Each of you. All of you. God loved you so much that he sent his son to be born in a manger.

The angels put their finger right on what the gospel is: good news of a great joy which will be to all the people. Not just to the intellectuals, not only to the oppressed and downtrodden, not just to the righteous. To ALL the people.

If you are a child of God and your neighbor is a child of God, you are brother and sister.

We serve the Lord with gladness!!



How to keep warm in church

- Rush to the front. That will warm you up, and you'll avoid when the door in the back of the church opens.
- Invite your neighbors and friends, and sit twelve people to a pew.
- Seat yourself near the pulpit. Most of the hot air is emitted from that area.
- Wear thermal underwear (in the appropriate liturgical colors, of course).
- Wait for an unfamiliar hymn - and then watch the sparks fly!

WWJD key chain



This craft is a reminder of Jesus' perfect example for us. When we ask "What Would Jesus Do?" we can build our character to be more like his.

What you need:

- 16 inches of bead and jewelry cord (about 1 mm thick)
- 32 mm split ring (key ring)
- 4 wooden beads (about 1 cm or 3/8")
- 5 jewelry beads (plastic or wooden, about 1/2 cm or 1/2")
- black permanent marker

What you do:

1. Fold your jewelry cord in half.
2. Put the loop of the jewelry cord through the split ring.
3. Put the ends of the cord through the loop to make a knot.
4. Thread the two ends through one of your small beads.
5. Then thread the rest of the beads (alternating between small and large, ending with a small bead).
6. Tie two or three knots at the end to hold the beads in place.
7. With a permanent marker, write a letter (W, W, J and D) on each of the four wooden beads. On the opposite side of each bead, write the same letter.
